1. Background

Examiner Insight

Distinction-level introductions do not merely “start” the essay. They establish relevance, introduce tension and transition naturally into the argument.

Strong backgrounds should:

- sound mature and controlled
- avoid memorised statistics
- create intellectual depth
- remain concise

For O-Level essays, the two strongest and most versatile introduction styles are:

1. Historical Background
2. Contrast Background

A. HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

Example 1 — Technology

Examiner Insight

Weak conclusions merely repeat earlier points mechanically.

Distinction-level conclusions:

- synthesise arguments
- reinforce evaluation
- broaden implications
- sound thoughtful rather than dramatic

The strongest conclusions leave the examiner with a sense of maturity and intellectual control.

A. CALL TO ACTION

Example 1 — Climate Change

Ultimately, addressing climate change requires more than symbolic campaigns and temporary public concern. Governments, corporations and individuals alike must recognise their shared responsibility before environmental damage becomes increasingly irreversible.

Example 2 — Cyberbullying

Ultimately, combating cyberbullying requires more than stricter school rules alone. Parents, educators, online platforms and students themselves must work collectively to create a safer and more responsible digital environment.

Example 3 — Education

Ultimately, improving education requires more than simply producing good examination results. Schools and societies alike must focus on nurturing resilience, creativity and critical thinking to prepare students for an increasingly complex future.

Example 4 — Mental Health

Ultimately, addressing mental health issues requires society to move beyond stigma and silence. Greater awareness, empathy and support systems are essential in ensuring that individuals receive the help they need before problems escalate further.

Example 5 — Technology Dependence
